CPTED is defined as the

proper design and effective use of the built environment that can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime and an improvement in the quality of life.

CPTED IS BASED ON THESE **5** OVERLAPPING STRATEGIES:

1 NATURAL SURVEILLANCE

Whether through windows, improved lighting, or personal awareness, increasing visibility reduces the likelihood of criminal activity.



2 TERRITORIAL REINFORCEMENT

This strategy is one that fosters a "vested interest" in the environment. When people feel that the area they live or work "belongs" to them, they will be more protective and concerned about its potential for crime.



3 NATURAL ACCESS CONTROL

Natural access control uses elements like doors, shrubs, fences, and gates to deter entry and create the perception of risk for offenders.



4 ACTIVITY SUPPORT

Using the environment to promote positive activities and discourage negative ones, such as encouraging use of well-lit, maintained spaces while deterring activity in neglected areas.



5 MAINTENANCE

Maintaining a clean, functional environment to prevent criminal activity and foster a sense of order and care deters crime.
